What does this do?

Learning zones are distinct areas within a learning space that are used to differentiate between various forms of learning and teaching. Each learning zone can be categorised and defined based on the type of teaching and learning occurring in the area. Learning zones can be aligned with selected teaching approaches and inform decisions regarding use of technology and the learning space design.

How can it help?

Creating different learning zones can assist educators to use a common language to define learning spaces throughout the school. It can also help educators to identify how space can be used effectively based on their teaching and learning styles.

An example in practice

Two schools in Australia, St Peters Lutheran College in Queensland and Bayanami Public School in New South Wales have created learning zones in their learning spaces by designating different work areas based on the assigned task. For example, using Thornburg's Learning Domains, the students move to the 'campfire' for whole class instruction, then to the 'cave' for individual work, while students having difficulty with the task can move to the designated 'swamp' area.
